Important terms

PSE = post-secondary education

First degree = Undergraduate (usually 4 years), also known as Bachelor's Degree

Faculty = Arts - BA; Science - BSc; Commerce - BComm; Fine Arts - BFA; Engineering - BEng

Major = approx. 50% of courses in one subject area

Minor = approx. 25% of courses in one subject area

Masters = Graduate Degree, follows Bachelor's Degree

What are transcripts

A high school transcript is a legal document that records course names, marks earned, and credits hours during Grades 10, 11 and 12. There are two types of transcripts:

Official which has the school stamp and official signature; sent directly to PSE by high school **Unofficial** are neither signed nor sealed and can be given directly to a student.

How to get a transcript

- Fill out "Transcript Request" form available in Guidance, Main Office, or schoolcashonline
- Official transcripts will be emailed directly to the institution (may take up to five days).
- Please do not wait until the last minute when requesting transcripts.

How to apply to college or univesity

- Application Form (submitted online) college / university website or OUAC for Ontario schools
- Application Fee cost varies according to school (may be free at Open House or on-the-spot)
- Official Transcript (mailed, emailed or faxed from BMHS)
- Sometimes a portfolio, audition, written work, etc., may be required.
- Remember acceptance is conditional until June final marks are received and graduation is confirmed.

- My Blueprint is a website that can help students learn about themselves and their interests, occupations, post-secondary schools and programs, and provide other resources to help students with their plans for after high school.
- All students have access to a free account. Any student who does not have an account can contact their school counsellor for information on how to create one.

College & University ... same but different?

College programs require 1 or 2 year(s) of study after which a diploma or certificate is awarded. The focus of college education is to help students develop job ready skills and qualifications directly related to the work force.

University usually requires at least 4 years of study where students enter a faculty (e.g. Sciences, Arts, Business, etc.), select a major (e.g. Biology, History, Music, etc.) and earn a bachelor's degree. Students may learn job ready skills and directly enter the workforce or may be required to take further education to earn professional qualifications (e.g. pharmacist, teacher, dentist, etc.)

Articulation Agreements allow students to combine the college and university experience. These are formalized agreements between some universities and colleges that recognize college coursework, thus credits can be applied towards degree.

What can I do to best prepare during grade 12?

	→ Most university applications open around mid-October (apply online).		
November	Visit post-secondary education institutions' websites and research programs that interest you, e.g. admissions requirements, qualifications earned, fees, length of time, preparation for the work world.		
	Decided on a university program and your average is +80%? Apply for early admissions this month.		
December	Double check admissions requirements and, if necessary, make course changes for second semester. Post-secondary education admission in Canada is based on marks earned in specific grade 12 courses. English 121/122 is always required for an English university.
